# Can/could/would you ... ? etc. (Requests, offers, permission and invitations)



#### POLITE REQUESTS

A

Could you open the door, please?



- Asking people to do things (requests): We use can or could to ask people to do things:
  - EX1: Can you wait a moment, please? or Could you wait a moment, please?
  - EX2: Helen, can you do me a favor?
  - EX3: Excuse me, could you tell me how to get to the bus station?
- ❖ You can say Do you think you could ... ?:
  - EX4: Do you think you could take me to the airport?
     (not Do you think you can)

#### **ASKING FOR THINGS**

- To ask for something, we use Can (I) have ...? / Could (I) have ...? or Can (I) get ...?:
  - EX5: in a shop. Can I have these postcards, please? or Can I get these postcards, please?
  - EX6: in a restaurant. Could we have the menu, please? or Can we have the menu, please?
- \* May I have ... ? is also possible:
  - EX7: May I have these postcards, please?

### POLITE REQUESTS

#### Could I use your phone charger?



- Asking to do things We use can I or could I to ask to do something:
  - EX8: (on the phone) Hello, can I speak to Steve, please?
  - EX9: 'Could I use your phone charger?' 'Sure.'
  - EX10: Do you think I could borrow your bike?
- May is also possible:
  - EX10: May I ask you a question?
- May is more formal than can or could. You can also say:
  Do you mind if I ...? Is it all right if I ...? / Is it OK if I ...?
  - EX11: Do you mind if I use your phone charger?
  - EX12: 'Is it all right if I sit here?' 'Yes, of course.'

Offering and inviting - You can use Can I ... ? to offer to do something:

- EX13: 'Can I help you?' 'No, it's OK. I can manage, thanks.'
- EX14:'Can I get you some coffee?' 'That would be nice.'

To offer or to invite, we use Would you like ... ? (not Do you like):

- EX15: 'Would you like some coffee?' 'No, thanks.'
- EX16: 'Would you like to eat with us tonight?' 'That would be great.'

I'd like ... (= I would like) is a polite way to say what you want:

- EX17: (at a tourist information off ice) I'd like some information about hotels, please.
- EX18: (in a shop) I'd like to try on this jacket, please.
