


FOR OR SINCE

- Ex1: Richard has been in Canada for six months. (not since six months)
- Ex2: We've been waiting for two hours.
 (not since two hours)
- Ex3: I've lived in London for a long time.

SINCE + MỐC THỜI GIAN



- Ex4: Richard has been in Canada since January. (= from January to now)
- Ex5: We've been waiting since 9 o'clock.
 (= from 9 o'clock to now)
- Ex6: I've lived in London since I was ten years old.

FOR OR AGO

- Ex7: Susan started her new job three weeks ago. (= three weeks before now)
- Ex8: 'When did Tom go out?' Ten minutes ago.' (= ten minutes before now)
- Ex9: I had dinner an hour ago.
- Ex10: Life was very different a hundred years ago.

We use ago with the past (started/did/had/was etc.).
