must + infinitive (must do / must work etc.)

I/We/You/They
He/She/It

### CÁCH DÙNG

- I must (do something) = I need to do it:
  - Ex1: I'm very hungry. I must eat something.
  - Ex2: It's a fantastic film. You must see it.
  - Ex3: The windows are very dirty. We must clean them.
- For the past (yesterday / last week etc.), we use had to ... (not must):
  - Ex4: I was very hungry. I had to eat something. (not I must eat)
  - Ex5: We had to walk home last night. There were no buses.

(not We must walk)



### MUSTN'T

C

I mustn't (do something) = it is necessary not to do it, it is the wrong thing to do:



- Ex6: I must go. I mustn't be late.
- Ex7: I mustn't forget to phone Chris.
  - (= I must remember to phone her)
- Ex8: Be happy! You mustn't be sad.
  - (= don't be sad)
- Ex9: You mustn't touch the pictures.
  - (= don't touch the pictures)



### DON'T NEED TO

D

- I don't need (to do something) = it is not necessary:
  - Ex10: I don't need to go yet. I can stay a little longer.
  - Ex11: You don't need to shout. I can hear you OK.
- \*You can also say don't have to ...
  - EX12: I don't have to go yet. I can stay a little longer.
- \* Compare don't need to and mustn't:
  - Ex13: You don't need to go. You can stay here if you want.
  - Ex14: You mustn't go. You must stay here.
