


## WOULD YOU LIKE ...?

A

### Would you like ...? = Do you want ...?

- \* We use Would you like ... ? to offer things:
  - Ex1: A: Would you like some coffee?
    - B: No, thank you.
  - Ex2: A: Would you like a chocolate?
    - B: Yes, please.
  - Ex3: A: What would you like, tea or coffee?
    - B: Tea, please.
- \* We use Would you like to ...? to invite somebody:
  - Ex4: Would you like to go for a walk?
  - Ex5: A: Would you like to eat with us on Sunday?
  - B: Yes, I'd love to. (= I would love to eat with you)
  - Ex6: What would you like to do this evening?



# Would you like...? / I'd like...



### I'D LIKE

I'd like ... is a polite way to say 'I want'.

I'd like = I would like

- Ex7: I'm thirsty. I'd like a drink.
- Ex8: (in a tourist office) I'd like some information about hotels, please.
- Ex9: I'm feeling tired. I'd like to stay at home this evening.

# Would you like...? / I'd like...



### WOULD YOU LIKE ...? V.S DO YOU LIKE ...?



#### Would you like...?/ I'd like



#### Would you like some tea? = Do you want some tea?

- Ex10: A: Would you like to go to the cinema tonight? (= do you want to go tonight?)
  - B: Yes, I'd love to.
- Ex11: I'd like an orange, please. (= can I have an orange?)
- Ex12: What would you like to do next weekend?

#### Do you like...? / I like...



#### Do you like tea? = Do you think tea is nice?

- Ex13: A: **Do you like** going to the cinema? (in general)
  - B: Yes, I go to the cinema a lot.
- Ex14: I like oranges. (in general)
- Ex15: What do you like to do at weekends?
