


## too/either – so am I /neither do I, etc....



## A

### TOO/ EITHER



We use too and either at the end of a sentence.

#### We use too after a positive verb:

- EX1: A: I'm happy.
   B: I'm happy too.
- EX2: A: I enjoyed the film.
  - B: I enjoyed it too.
- EX3: Jane is a doctor. Her husband is a doctor too.

#### We use either after a negative verb:

- EX4: A: I'm not happy.
  - B: I'm not happy either.
- EX5: A: I can't cook.
  - B: | can't either.
- EX6: Ben doesn't watch TV. He doesn't read newspapers either.

# too/either – so am I /neither do I, etc....

## SO AM I / NEITHER DO I

so am I = I am too so have I = I have too (etc.):

- EX7: A: I'm working.
   B: So am I. (= I'm working too)
- EX8: A: I was late for work today.
  - B: So was Sam
- EX9: A: I work in a bank.
  - B: So do I.
- EX10: A: We went to the cinema last night.
  - B: Did you? So did we.
- EX11: A: **I'd** like to go to Australia.
  - B: So would I.

neither am I = I'm not either
neither can I = I can't either (etc.):


- EX12: A: I haven't got a key.
  - B: Neither have I.

    ( = I haven't either)
- EX13: A: Kate can't cook.
  - B: Neither can Tom.
- EX14: A: I won't (=will not) be here tomorrow.
  - B: Neither will I
- EX15: A: I never go to the cinema.
  - B: Neither do I.

You can also use

Nor (=Neither):

- EX16: A: I'm not married.
  - B: Nor am I. or Neither am I.



Remember:

So am I (not So I am) Neither have I (not Neither I have).
