A CÂU HỎI VỚI CÁC TỪ ĐỂ HỎI VÀ GIỚI TỪ



Jessica is talking to somebody. Who is she talking to?

In questions beginning Who . . . / What ... ? / Where ... ? / Which ... ?, prepositions (to/from/with etc.) usually go at the end:

- Ex1: 'Where are you from?' 'I'm from Thailand.'
- Ex2: 'Jack was afraid.' 'What was he afraid of?'
- Ex3: 'Who do these books belong to?' 'They're mine.'
- Ex4: 'Tom's father is in hospital.' 'Which hospital is he in?'
- Ex5: 'Kate is going on holiday.' 'Who with?' / 'Who is she going with?'
- Ex6: 'Can we talk?' 'Sure. What do you want to talk about?



CÁCH DÙNG CÂU HỎI "WHAT IS IT LIKE?"



When we say 'What is it like?' like is a preposition. It is not the verb like ('Do you like your new house?' etc.).

- Ex7: A: There's a new restaurant in our street.
 - B: What's it like? Is it good?
 - A: I don't know. I haven't eaten there yet.
- Ex8: A: What's your new teacher like?
 - B: She's very good. We learn a lot.
- Ex9: A: I met Nicola's parents yesterday.
 - B: Did you? What are they like?
 - A: They're very nice.
- Ex10: A: Did you have a good holiday? What was the weather like?
 - B: It was lovely. It was sunny every day.
