








TO AND FROM / INTO AND OUT OF




EX1: Jane is going to France next week.

EX4: We jumped into the water.


EX5: A man came out of the house and got into a car.

EX7: I took the old batteries out of the radio.




EX8: I put new batteries in the radio.





ON AND OFF / UP AND DOWN / OVER AND UNDER




Don't put your feet on the table.

EX12: Be careful! Don't fall off your bike.


EX13: We got on the bus in Princes Street.

EX17: I jumped over the wall into the garden.


EX18: Some people say it is unlucky to walk under a ladder.

EX19: A bird flew into the room through a window.


EX20: The old road goes through the village.

EX22: The bus stop is just round the corner.


EX23: I walked round the town and took some

EX26: Let's go for a walk along the river.


EX27: The dog swam across the river.
